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Tutto Italiano Benvenuto a *Tutto Italiano*

An early Etruscan settlement reestablished as a Roman colony in 59 BC by Julius Caesar, <u>Florence</u> has a rich history, most notably in the banking industry as the home of the <u>Medici family</u> and as the birthplace of the Renaissance. In 1865, Florence replaced Turin as the capital of Italy, and was replaced by Rome in 1871.

When Florence became part of the Roman Empire, Caesar built the city as a refuge for military veterans. After the fall of the Roman Empire, Florence was ruled by the Goths, Byzantines, and Lombards; seized by Charlemagne; and was part of various duchies. During the 1200s, the Medici family migrated to Florence, first joining the medical guild, then becoming government officials, and by the mid-fourteenth century, the family became involved in banking and commerce.

Their wealth and prestige were the basis of their humanistic and artistic approach to education and culture, and the House of Medici was a patron of some of the most well-known Italians throughout the world today: Botticelli, da Vinci, Galileo, Michelangelo, and Vespucci, among others.

The <u>Florence skyline</u> is distinctive, dominated by <u>Brunelleschi's Dome</u>, topping the Cathedral of Santa Maria del Fiore, and the bell tower of <u>Palazzo Vecchio</u> (Old Palace). Both are in the <u>Historic Centre of Florence</u> – inscribed as a World Heritage Site in 1982 – and also includes the <u>Uffizi Gallery</u> and the <u>Palazzo Pitti</u>.

Another noteworthy feature of Florence is the <u>Wine Window</u>. Small windows carved about four feet above street level, the openings allowed the easy exchange of payment for a cup or a flask of wine.
