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Tutto Italiano Benvenuto a *Tutto Italiano*

October is Italian American Heritage Month, usually noted with little fanfare or acknowledgment outside of Italian American communities. This year because of the coronavirus, parades and many in-person celebrations have been canceled; but throughout the country, cities with a higher percentage of Italian Americans are celebrating Italian heritage.

Each year, federal and various state governments officially proclaim October as Italian American Heritage Month. On October 2nd, a Resolution was introduced "<u>Recognizing the month of October 2020 as 'Italian-American Heritage Month' in</u> <u>Pennsylvania</u>," beginning with "Whereas Italian Americans have contributed to a great number of aspects of our everyday life in the United States ..."

In Massachusetts, the governor signed a Proclamation recognizing October as Italian American Heritage Month and mentioning five Italian-Americans, including <u>Dr.</u> <u>Anthony Fauci, who recorded a message of thanks</u> and "discusses his Italian heritage and why he chose to work in public health."

In California, <u>Italian American festivities in the San Francisco Bay Area</u> will be virtual, with a High Mass streamed from Ss. Peter & Paul Church website followed by a show "featuring dignitaries, music, performances, and representatives of Italian and Italian-American organizations and businesses." The Little Italy of Los Angeles Association (LILAA) has <u>scheduled a variety of events</u> including "an interactive workshop to teach Italians how to tell their stories and leave their legacies; and an old-fashioned drive-in experience showing" Italian films.

In New Jersey "the traditional <u>Nutley-Belleville Columbus Day and Italian Heritage</u> <u>Month Parade</u>" was modified, replaced by "a caravan of cars [that] will follow the usual parade route." A flag raising, a presentation of Italy's and America's national anthems, and a wreath laying ceremony are scheduled.

Italian Culture in America: How a Founding Father introduced Italian Art, Architecture, Food, Wine, and Liberty to the American People by Ralph G. Giordano In 1784, Thomas Jefferson was sent to Paris; the following year he succeeded Benjamin Franklin as Minister to France. Jefferson visited Italy in 1787, and he returned to America in 1789, with a deep appreciation of Italian culture.

During "general discussions on American culture" with an Italian American colleague, a "cultural connection to Thomas Jefferson" and his affinity for Italian culture became apparent. Ralph had "ventured into many areas of academic and cultural fields," but his "40-year journey with Mr. Jefferson" – first learning about Jefferson in the author's early career as an architect – provided Ralph with the inspiration to research and write the book.

I asked Ralph, "With the current controversies surrounding so many of the country's forefathers, is Jefferson's significance in establishing the culture of America still relevant? He replied:

"... the American Revolution was a political separation – the colonies remained 'culturally dependent' upon Great Britain. In searching for a Cultural Independence, individuals such as Thomas Jefferson explored – by way of discovering the architecture of Renaissance Italians such as Andrea Palladio – and the personal interaction with Filippo 'Philip' Mazzei the wonders of Italian culture. With Mazzei, the basic idea of 'personal liberty' was derived from Humanism (a concept developed by the Italian Renaissance and refined during the Enlightenment). This author holds the view – discrediting Jefferson is an attempt to negate the idea of each human born with inherent natural rights. Jefferson argued 'genius is not by accident of birth' – therefore his search to reject a culture, such as Great Britain which was dictated by the direct rule of a King or Queen, even religious belief; was to find a culture worthy of the people such as derived from Italy.

With moral controversies of so many of the country's forefathers, the questions seem to dismiss the vast contributions to the so-called American ideology provided by the likes of Thomas Jefferson. Simple – discredit Jefferson leads to discrediting the 'natural right' of people to govern themselves. Thereby, allowing a return to rule by Tyranny and a return to people believing a ruler is ordained by 'Divine Right' and not by the will of the people. In that same sense a distinct culture would also be lost."

Italian Culture in America provides a substantive look into how Jefferson infused Italian culture into a developing American culture, in an easy-to-read format. Each chapter details historical facts and includes illustrations, images, and an Appendix. A comprehensive Bibliography and Index are included.

The typical claims against Columbus cite genocide, slave trade, and other atrocities, all without verified substantial documentation. Included in the diatribe is the assertion that Columbus did not land on American soil, so – in retrospect – he should not receive any tributes for landing on and exploring the uncharted islands of an unknown landmass.

This is one allegation that is true. It's also true that not one person on the unknown continents (of what is now North America and South America) lived on American soil. It was not until 1507 when the first map of the newly explored landmass was named America, after another great Italian explorer, Amerigo Vespucci. (Some claim America was named after other people or concepts.)
