Tutto Italiano Benvenuto a *Tutto Italiano*

One of the largest ship builders in the world, <u>Fincantieri SpA</u>. based in Trieste, Italy, owns 20 <u>shipyards</u>; among them, eight in Italy and two in Wisconsin (acquired in 2009). The company notes the "first modern shipyard" was built in Castellammare di Stabia – in Naples – in 1780; and through mergers and acquisitions, Fincantieri grew, building merchant and passenger ships, and naval vessels.

In 1959, Fincantieri was founded as a "state financial holding company to oversee the main Italian shipyards," and in 1984, it became an operating company. It continued to expand, focusing on "high-value-added products: cruise ships, ferries, and naval vessels." Production is separated by type within its two divisions, merchant ships and naval vessels. By mid-2000, three new business categories were added: mega yachts, ship repair and conversions, and systems integration.

With its absorption of prior ship-building companies, Fincantieri's achievements include (at the time) "the largest ship ever launched in the Mediterranean" (1912), "the first Italian super ocean liner" (1925), "the first ship with balcony cabins" (1927), "the largest training ship of all time (<u>Amerigo Vespucci</u>, 1931), "the first air-conditioned ship (1931), and "the record for the fastest transatlantic crossing of a passenger ship" (1933), among others.

After World War II, the use of steam engines to power ships was declining as diesel engines became more efficient. In 1966, shortly after the cruise ship <u>Eugenio C</u>, was built for Costa Cruises and delivered from the <u>Monfalcone shipyard</u> (region of Friuli-Venezia Giulia), Fincantieri took ownership of the facility. By then, steam turbines were the choice of shipbuilders and cruise ships were in demand. The <u>Crown</u> <u>Princess</u>, designed by acclaimed architect <u>Renzo Piano</u>, was the first cruise ship built by Fincantieri at the Monfalcone shipyard. Since then, it has <u>built passenger ships</u> for all the major cruise lines including Carnival, Cunard, Disney, Holland America, Regent, and Viking.

In June 2018, the "<u>biggest ship ever built in Italy</u>" – the <u>MSC Seaview</u> – was delivered to MSC Cruises from the Monfalcone shipyard.

Located on the northeastern coast of Liguria, the Muggiano shipyard was established in 1883, but it is noted that the area had been contemplated first by Napoleon, and then by Camillo Benso, Count of Cavour, as a naval ship building base. During World War I, the shipyard increased its production of submarines for the Italian Navy and for other countries. Production continued during World War II, but the shipyard was significantly damaged. It was rebuilt and in 1984, under ownership of Fincantieri, the shipyard specialized in constructing naval vessels. In 1999, "the keel for the first Italian submarine [of four] of the U212A class, Salvatore Todaro (S526), was laid at the Muggiano shipyard; the submarine was launched in November 2003 and commissioned into service in March 2006."

In 1942, <u>Fincantieri Marine Group</u> was founded "as a U.S. subsidiary of Fincantieri." Located by the Menominee River in Marinette, Wisconsin, "the shipyard's government portfolio includes ships for the United States Coast Guard and Navy." In May 2020, it was announced that "Fincantieri Marine has been awarded \$5.5 billion to develop the U.S. Navy's newest class of warships."

The groups opposing Columbus Day have an organized agenda to eliminate it from America; Italian Americans do not have an organized defense.
