Tutto Italiano Benvenuto a *Tutto Italiano*

Along the coast of Campania, the semi-circular inlet of the Gulf of Naples surrounds the <u>Phlegraean Islands</u> – Ischia, Nisida, Procida, and Vivara – off its northern shore. <u>Ischia</u> – divided into the historic section <u>Ischia Ponte</u> and the newer <u>Ischia Porto</u> – and the largest island at around 21 square miles, is known for its spas and <u>Aragonese</u> <u>Castle</u>, built in the fifth century BC by Hiero I of Syracuse on a rocky islet off the northeast shore of the island.

A few miles northeast of the castle, the small island (about four square miles) of <u>Procida</u> is a popular summer retreat for Neapolitans. As with Ischia, and the internationally well-known villages along the Amalfi Coast and Capri (both about 15 miles southeast of Procida) the steep cliffs and colorful houses of Procida offer picturesque views. In January, <u>Procida was chosen for the Italian Capital of Culture for 2022</u>. The designation of Italian Capital of Culture is a competition created in 2014 to support and bring attention to the importance of the traditions of all cities in Italy.

On the southwest corner of Procida, a <u>causeway connects to Vivara</u>, a tiny (less than an acre) crescent-shaped atoll that is a nature reserve. With numerous species of birds and botanics, and traces of settlement during Mycenaean Greece (1600–1100 BC), <u>Vivara</u> is a treasure for scientific and archeological research.

Closest to Naples, and slightly smaller than Vivara, Nisida is <u>connected to the</u> <u>mainland with a stone bridge</u>. Although small in size, the island has a substantial history as the location of villas for military leaders during the Roman Empire, a castle, a monastery, a prison, a command center for the Italian Air force and Italian Navy, and a rehabilitation center for boys. In 1831 the French composer <u>Hector Berlioz wrote</u> <u>about his visit to Nisida</u>.

One hundred and ten years ago on March 25th, 146 people perished in the <u>Triangle</u> <u>Shirt Factory fire</u>; at least 35 were Italian women. The top three floors of the ten-story building, in New York City, housed the factory, but it was the eighth floor where the fire started and the ninth floor where so many died. The fire – one of the worst disasters in New York City – put more force behind the movement for safety and labor laws
